First Lutheran Church Annual Meeting Minutes February 11, 2024

Attendance of 100 members confirmed a quorum was met, and the meeting was called to order by President Cindy Redmond at 12:04 pm. Cindy reminded those in attendance to review the agenda, minutes, and financial report, as time permits between agenda items, to give time for participation from online attendees. Pastor Brian opened the meeting with prayer.

Agenda: The annual meeting agenda was presented, and Cindy provided instructions for speaking or submitting questions online. Keith Diekevers moved to approve the agenda as presented, and Lois Northey seconded; motion carried.

2023 Minutes: The minutes from the 2023 annual meeting were presented for review. Jan Larson moved to approve the minutes as written, and Mary Thunhorst seconded; motion carried.

Old Business:

Drive-in Worship area: The projects left to complete on the drive-in building after last year's annual meeting have been completed: the railing has been installed on the front of the stage, and installation of a finished floor over the subfloor is underway. This summer, we will celebrate the 75th Anniversary for FLC drive-in worship services. There will be a celebration on August 11th. Although still in the planning stages, the celebration will include just one special service that day at the drive-in worship area, with food, a concert and more. As we prepare for the celebration, there are a couple of projects that need to be done; we will add landscaping, and install a water line for a sprinkler to keep the new plantings alive. We will also be replacing the driveway, which took a beating during construction. Also during construction, there were mounds of dirt that had been pushed up by the trees on the north edge of the church campus; the dirt will be moved and grass will be seeded. People will be able to park in the lot and take lawn chairs down to the drive-in worship area. John Adams is working on raising funds for the celebration, as no money will be taken out of the budget. Ron Dicks reminded the group that the water line will be connected to the well, so there will not be any additional expense to the water bill.

Pastor Perry updated the members on the Columbarium and the Three Cross Memorial Garden. The trees have been planted, the landscaping is done and the area looks beautiful. The first Columbarium has 46 niches sold. He also talked about the importance of taking care of the Columbarium; some changes were made to the purchase price of the niches and the ancillary products that are attached to the niche. Part of the reason for that, is to provide funds for the care and maintenance of the Columbarium in perpetuity. Rather than pricing everything separately, as was done in the past, moving forward the cost will be \$2500 for the niche, and will include everything except the engraving on the nameplate. Dennis Heimdal asked about the scattering gardens for pets; Pastor Perry said the committee decided not to proceed with that, but there is a pet memorial garden area where pets can be buried in biodegradable bamboo urns. Phylis Anderson asked how the new pricing will affect those who have already purchased their niches. Cindy said they may be asked to donate to cover those costs, but there will be no requirement.

Cindy asked the Columbarium Committee to stand and be recognized, as she read their names. Serving on the committee were Bob Brown, John Adams, Denny Perry, Jo Abens, Gary Fisk, Kris Johnson, Len Holdorf and Cindy Redmond. She thanked the committee, and said they would be happy to answer any questions that come up. Pastor Perry added his thanks and appreciation to the committee, for all the time and effort it took to make the Columbarium project come to fruition.

Cindy then recognized the people that worked on the 150th Anniversary of FLC, and all of the time that it took to put together such a wonderful celebration. There were many volunteers helping in many areas; Cindy offered a special thank you to the Deacon Board, Susan and Cory Coulander, Gary Gunderson, and Ann and Perry Aalgaard.

Reports:

Financial/Trustees Report – Gary Peters presented and reviewed the financial report for 2023, starting with the income report. Several contributing factors resulted with the year end \$69,000 short on the income column, offset by the expense column showing \$76,000 under budget; between keeping the costs under control and other outlying reasons, we ended the year in the black, with a surplus of \$53,000. That was added to the reserves coming into 2024. Gary asked for questions about the 2023 YE financials, and thanked Val Watters for doing a great job of getting the reports out, so the Board of Trustees can monitor the finances on a monthly basis.

Auditing Committee Report – Cindy Redmond presented the Auditing Committee report. The audit was performed by Emily Rossman, FLC treasurer and Cole Milbrath, Board of Trustees member. They reviewed the statement of assets and liabilities, as of December 31, 2023, and found the statements accurately reflect the financial condition of FLC as of this date. There were no questions or concerns. Helen Bauman moved to approve the financial report as presented, and Cari Jack seconded; motion carried.

Personnel Committee – Joseph Prouty provided an update about the duties of the newest committee at FLC. The committee was formed to review job descriptions, do a market analysis on wages for comparable positions and updating the employee handbook. Cindy recognized the members of the committee: Barb Work, Chair; Joseph Prouty, Nancy Wurtz, Amanda Titterington, and Gary Peters

Nomination Committee & Election – Pastor Perry read the 2024 ballot, with the slate of candidates who have been nominated and agreed to serve. Each vacancy has been filled. Hearing no nominations from the floor, Peter Redmond moved that nominations cease, and Kris Rowley seconded the motion; motion carried. Denny Perry then moved to cast a unanimous ballot, and Dave Rowley seconded; motion carried.

New Business:

2024 Budget – Gary Peters presented the budget, and explained how the committee decided on the 2024 numbers, adding it was discussed and approved by the Board of Trustees and the full Church Council. The total proposed income for 2024 is 858,500; the anticipated expenses for the year \$970,790. The excess of \$112,290 will come out of reserve funds, so won't be asking for funds from the congregation. Gary highlighted a few of the income and expense figures:

The \$56,500 expense for the 75th Anniversary is also shown as income: the goal is to raise that same amount through fundraising. Projection equipment needs to be replaced with current technology, so \$30,000 has been budgeted for that. The budget has \$10,000 to support the summer Senior High Youth Trip to New Orleans; 15 Youth from our church will be going, along with 4 adults. The budget for utility accounts was increased, as costs for those continue to rise on a regular basis. The budget for two new A/C units for fellowship hall is \$113,00; one needs replacing this year, and reserve funds will be used for this first one. Gary said we don't know if we'll need to spend money on Columbarium administration, since we have simplified the process of the sales by making it a lump sum; it's there if we need someone to keep track of the monies for the project. Benevolence was increased by 7% to \$8,0000, to support outside organizations that apply to the Mission Committee. Gary mentioned that a lot of time and effort went into the new Personnel Committee, and the committee will continue forward.

Questions – Carol DeSchepper asked about full time versus part time employees, and pro-rating. Part-time employees get a prorated amount of fringe benefit. Archie Barriage asked what happened to the building fund; although the previous fund was depleted when roof work was done, Val explained money is being designated for building fund in online giving. Dennis Heimdal asked a question about the youth pastor position. It was not a part of the 2024 budget, but it is being analyzed for the future.

Ron Dicks moved to approve the 2024 budget as presented, Arne Rasmussen seconded; motion carried.

Mission Team – Pastor Perry presented the Mission Team update. He said there has been discussion to make some changes in how the Mission Team functions, and how to get them to be a board on the Full Council. They are looking at ways to empower the congregation in their service with mission outreach, rather than the Mission Team doing all the work themselves. FLC gives away over \$100,000 per year. Cindy recognized the Mission Team – Phylis Anderson, Cari Jack, Lynn Egesdal, Gary Fisk, Linda Nase, Kia Gonnerman, Trisha Ferguson, Ann Aalgaard – and thanked them for their hard work and dedication.

Other Business:

Pastor Perry introduced the staff and thanked them for their good work; Cindy offered special thanks to Pastor Perry and Pastor Brian. Cindy recognized the retiring church council and board members, current board members, and newly elected board members, thanking them for serving on the boards. Pastor Perry thanked Cindy for her leadership as President of the congregation.. Cindy closed with the Lord's Prayer, and adjourned the meeting at 1:06 pm.

SENIOR PASTOR REPORT

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As I reflect on the past year there are many events to remember and these events bring different emotions to my mind; gratitude, hopefulness, despair, doubt, hope, fear, hate, and love. Each year, month, week, and day we have emotions or feelings which move into our being and flood us. Just like the floods this spring ran through buildings, cars, and lives, so too, our emotions can run over and through our lives and our true selves God has created us to be. The Bible states we were created in God's image. To be in God's image is our true self, where we can feel peace about ourselves and our place in this world. Characteristics of the true self include the eight C's; curiosity, courage, confidence, connectedness, creativity, calmness, clarity, and compassion. When we are flooded by negative emotions these qualities are drowned out, but when we are acting in and out of our true self we can do amazing things.

In the reports by staff and board chairs you have read about many of the wonderful things this congregation has done and is continuing to do. These remarkable things happen because God has created you to be amazing and you are living out what God created you to be! You are sharing your time, talents, and treasures, and it is making a difference in the world! It brings me great joy to witness the wonderful things God is doing through you!

In May I attended a leadership retreat in Colorado at a place called QuietWaters Ministries. It has made a huge difference in how I understand life in general and myself. I have come to understand how our negative emotions can and do impact how we view our lives, our roles in the community, and those around us. These negative emotions can flood out our true God self, leaving us a shell of what God created us to be. I have seen how these negative feelings can hurt our relationships with ourselves, those in our community, and with God. I have also learned the hurts which cause these emotions are not healed by time or by hiding them away. They must be engaged to eliminate their power to disrupt our true selves.

We live in a society which promotes being busy and constantly on the run, with seemingly a million things to do and to choose from each day. With so many encounters each day it is easy to become flooded with feelings. We may feel a number of things like being overwhelmed, anxiety, shame, self-doubt, or worthlessness. These feelings can make it really hard for us to function in our true self that is made in the image of God. These flooded emotions can become like burdens we carry around, holding us back from being our best. In gospel of Matthew Jesus speaks of the burdens we carry and how in Him the load is lightened. Matthew 11:28-30 "Come to me, all you who are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." Let us always put our hope in Jesus our savior, the one who takes away the burdens of life and brings to our spirit a new life. He is the healer which makes us new and heals

us from our burdened parts.

As a congregation we are made up of many parts and just as in our body when one or some of the parts are struggling, so too, will the whole body. In the coming year I want to challenge us, as the body of Christ, to see the health of our faith community in a new light. Just as we are a group of sinners redeemed by Jesus, we are also a group of people who have each had times when we have struggled and wished things would be different. In these times of exile, we need to be able to slow down and listen to our feelings. To feel the sadness, fear, unworthiness, anxiety, or any other number of feelings we have so we can discover what they are trying to tell us. Too often, we quickly gloss over these feelings and push them down and hide them away, not taking time to engage them.

Over the next several years I would like to do more to help our members process the emotional, mental, and internal struggles we face in our lives. We have already introduced healing services on the fifth Sundays of the month, which are planned to help us to start thinking about the troubled parts we have. I would like us, as a congregation, to move deeper into understanding how the negative events in our lives impact us every day and what we can do to have healthier lives. This year First Lutheran church will be exploring the addition of a new staff position, a Parish Nurse. The intent of this new position would be to assist in caring for the physical, spiritual, and emotional concerns of congregational members. To me this is a very exciting possibility which you will hear more about in the coming days. I would also like to see what we can do as a congregation to care for people by supporting them in finding and receiving the counseling they need to move towards a healthier life.

This coming year has many things to be excited about, but what excites me the most is to be connected to the many wonderful people of this congregation who care about hearing and sharing the love of God, to a world in need of healing and love! I am so thankful for the talented and amazing staff we have here at First Lutheran. It is also a great blessing to work with the many dedicated people who volunteer their time and talents at First Lutheran! May 2025 be another year of blessings for this congregation!

Dear interested member,

I'm pleased you've taken an interest in the annual review of happenings among the congregation of First Lutheran during the two thousand and twenty fourth year of our Lord. For my part, below are a few highlights from the past year.

Mockingbird Conference – As a part of continuing education, in April I attended The Mocking Bird Conference in New York City. Mockingbird ministry gathers pastors, authors, and speakers from many other walks of life to speak on the message of God's grace within the reality of everyday life. Their work has informed much of the ministry I've been involved with for the past 10 years. I invite you to check it out for yourself at mbird.com

Research Sanctuary Video System – With the help of our music coordinator, Jennifer Johnson, and Pastor Perry, and I spent a good portion of the year researching options to update our video display system in the sanctuary. Hopefully by the time you're reading this the council will have ordered proceedings for installing a replacement display for the currently very dim projectors. I look forward to the new ways these updated displays will assist us in creating an immersive worship experience.

75th Drive-In Worship Celebration – I thoroughly enjoyed learning about the evolution of First Lutheran's drive-in worship services. We took a big step towards our goal of expanding the use of the drive-in area by hosting performing artist Jason Gray along with several local talents. Perhaps the greatest joy was watching First Lutheran do what the drive-in has always been about, welcoming visitors and locals alike to come and hear the good news of Jesus Christ.

"Love thy Neighbor" Fundraiser – Hot on the heels of the 75th anniversary celebration fundraiser First Lutheran quickly turned around and raised even more funds to help with local flood relief. Though there are no shortage of ways to live out the gospel, it lifted this pastor's heart to watch the congregation live into the mission statement we share at the end of the service each week, "Gathering to know Jesus, serving to make a difference." I look forward to the difference we'll make in 2025.

Prairie Project – I've explored over the closing months of 2024 what it might look like to restore the walking trail area north of the drive-in to native prairie. It will likely be a several year project but I've found several champions for the cause within First Lutheran and I hope you might be one too. We aim to maintain the trails, and not to disturb any of the gardening areas but the rest of the grassy area will look different during the conversion. Typically it's a three year process (at least) characterized as follows, "First it sleeps, then it creeps, then it leaps". Prayers for patience welcomed as we explore the possibilities of this conversion. More on this soon.

St. Dysmas – Our fellowship with the prison congregation of St. Dysmas continues to grow. We enjoyed hosting their Pastor Jeff Backer at a drive in service this summer. If you haven't attended I hope you'll consider joining on one of our quarterly visits.

Sabbatical – On a final note, I am currently making plans to take a sabbatical during the summer months (May, June, July) of 2025. It's hard to believe I'm entering into my 7th year of ministry at First Lutheran. It's gone swiftly and it continues to be an honor to be called to share the gospel among you all. Prayers welcomed as I plan for this time of rest, recovery, and rejuvenation for ministry.

A note regarding my upcoming sabbatical

I'm making plans to take sabbatical from May 1st through the end of July this year. First Lutheran is somewhat familiar with sabbaticals thanks in part to having offered one to Pastor Perry in recent memory. Still the question comes, what is a sabbatical? If you've heard of a sabbatical, likely you've heard of an academic sabbatical which is typically not a sabbatical of spiritual renewal. Academic sabbaticals involve projects of research, study or writing. They are breaks from a highly rigid academic schedule, but not from typical academic work. The person on sabbatical simply changes the focus of their work, usually to complete writing projects or related research. A ministry sabbatical is different.

First, a ministry sabbatical is a time of purposeful ceasing, resting and planned refreshment, with a spiritual renewal component or emphasis. The leave accomplishes a specific intent: to renew and restore vitality and health – spiritual, emotional, and physical – in spiritual leaders. Some elements of work may be a part of it, but would be different than the day in and day out typical responsibilities of ministry at First Lutheran. While that work could include research and writing, it could also be exploring a new devotional practice, traveling to significant locations that have shaped and informed our faith, or taking time to do something creative for use in the congregation or beyond.

Next, a ministry sabbatical is a complete stop. It is a ceasing from regular ministry routines and demands. While a portion of sabbatical time may include vacation time and rest, in a biblical sense this is not what sabbatical means. Rather it is a different kind of "work", the aim of which is a deeper intimacy with God by drawing closer and listening more carefully. It can involve reading, writing, and wrestling in prayer – particularly with our culture's tendency to be busy and find "busy" to be an acceptable response to the question, "How are you doing"?

Finally, a ministry sabbatical is an opportunity for others to share in ministry. Sabbatical can be an equipping opportunity for the congregation. On the one hand it will be a time for me to recognize and evaluate the things I've become accustomed to doing without thinking about them. On the other hand it's a time for the congregation to evaluate responsibilities that come about from my absence and how to manage them without adding all of them to Pr. Perry's responsibilities.

I can't help to lead the church some place I've never been. Continued revelation and illumination is essential to knowing Christ more intimately and seeking his wisdom to lead. This is the aim of sabbatical and I believe it will be beneficial for both you and me.

If you're interested in learning more about ministry sabbaticals you can find details in the Western Iowa Synod's Compensation Guidelines under Part V "Other Benefits" Subsection F "Sabbaticals". If you'd like more still you can read "A Sabbatical Primer for Pastors" by David C. Alves which focuses on helping both pastors and congregations plan for sabbaticals. Much of what I've shared here is adapted from these sources. Best of all, you can call me up or stop by my office to have a visit about it, so long as it's before I take leave on May 1st ©

ship center, a new sod area with waterline connecting from the church to drive-in grounds, and a new

listening area with native grass plantings. (This area is still under construction) It is located where the

the inspiring outdoor music concert by Jason Gray as part of our August 11th worship service.

That's quite an accomplishment for you and a tribute to our Lord, but you weren't done yet! Due to the

BOARD OF TRUSTEES 2024 Annual Report

The Board of Trustees met on a monthly basis during 2024 to tend to the financial affairs of the Church. The primary duty of the Board of Trustees is to guard and protect the financial resources of First Lutheran and monitor the use of those financial resources in a responsible and prudent manner and in ways which serve God and the members here at First Lutheran, the people in the immediate surrounding area, and the people of God throughout the world. The Board of Trustees has five sub-committees -- Buildings and Grounds, Missions, Stewardship, Foundation, and Budget. The Trustees Board is comprised of five elected members, four officers (President, Financial Secretary, Treasurer, and Secretary), and regular attendance by Pastor Perry, Pastor Brian, and Val Watters, bookkeeper.

The 2024 elected members were Nancy Wurtz, Cole Milbrath, Delmer Lee, Amanda Titterington, and myself as Chairman. Others attending were Cindy Redmond, President, Emily Rossman, Treasurer, Sheryl Paul, Financial Secretary, and Evy Robinson, Recording Secretary. Pastor Perry also attended on a regular basis and Pastor Brian as needed. The group worked diligently, took their responsibilities seriously, and were truly a pleasure to work with.

The total receipts for the operating budget for 2024 were \$992,284. The actual expenses for 2024 were \$978,852. This resulted in excess receipts over disbursements of \$13,702.

Thanks to all of you who assisted in achieving this budget surplus.

Highlights for 2024:

- ➤ Assisted in planning related to the 75th Anniversary of the Drive-In Worship and raised 100% of funds related to costs of the project. John Adams led the fundraising effort.
- > Planned for one new air conditioner unit for 2025.
- Commenced planning for a new projector/LED system for the church.
- Worked on remedies for radon identified in the church.
- > Supervised the completion of the first air conditioner project completed in 2024.
- Coordinated a fund-raising project for area flood victims. \$75,000 was raised and was allocated to agencies assisting with Flood relief in Spencer and the Lakes Area. John Adams assisted with the fund raising.
- Renewed the Head Start project for another year.
- > Arranged for the installation of the North Hallway furnace.
- > Commenced discussions regarding the hiring of a Parish Nurse.

We express a sincere thank you to Pastor Perry and Pastor Brian for their superb leadership during the year. We pray for God's guidance as we venture into another year of service in God's world.

First Lutheran Foundation 2024

Once again the First Lutheran Foundation had a very successful year in its commitment to impact the future of the church's ministry and mission. Our capital improvement fund (First Lutheran Fund) grew from \$81,387 to \$90,380 (a gain of \$8,993). Serving to make a difference. We say this every Sunday as part of our Mission Statement and it is exactly what the Mission Team is doing. We, along with many of you, have been participating in projects that have been helping make a difference locally, regionally and internationally.

One of our biggest projects each year is our fund raising meal. This year we were privileged to have the choir from Waldorf University entertain us while eating a delicious meal of roast beef, cheesy potatoes and green beans. Everyone enjoyed listening to them, especially when they invited all the alumni to come up and join them for the last song. Prior to the meal, we started the evening with a pie auction. It was a very successful evening and the money raised went to help support three projects: Atlas of Okoboji, Hope Missions Food Pantry in Omaha and the Igumbilo Girls School in Tanzania.

We have had many other projects that we supported throughout the year. It would take too long to name them all but I will share a few. We supported the J1 International students that come to our community during the summer to work at local businesses by providing them with two meals. We sponsored Feed Just One and made over 20,000 meals to be sent to needy areas around the world. We provided Easter meal boxes for the Veterans. We continued support to Pepe's Kids in Argentina. We helped with the Okoboji Success Program in the local schools. We helped fund Library Kits that can be checked out by our Sunday School kids. We provided frozen meals for families who are part of the Kings and Queens Adoptive and Foster family support group. As you can see we have been very busy and this is just a fraction of the organizations that we have supported in some way. We also want to thank you for helping us by donating your money, materials, time and talents to serve along with us. We wouldn't be able to do any of this without you.

Our goal is for the Mission Committee to become one of the governing boards of First Lutheran rather than just a committee. This means making a change to our constitution, which requires being voted on at two consecutive annual meetings. Again, thanks for all your help and support. This past year has been a tough one for many people in our community and around the world. It continues to be our goal to help lighten the load for as many as possible. God is Good!

THREE CROSS MEMORIAL GARDEN AND COLUMBARIUM COMMITTEE

We encourage you to take a moment, on a nice day, to go out and look at our beautiful Three Cross Memorial Garden! It is such a lovely addition to the north side of our church. THREE new benches, donated by our members, have been added to the garden within this last year. The benches offer people the opportunity to take time to sit, rest, memorialize, and pay tribute to loved ones inurned in our columbarium. We also offer another viewing option; this is a room located at the end of the hall leading to the columbarium, but to the left as you prepare to exit through the outside door. You are welcome to use it at any time you choose; this room has a window that offers a direct view of the garden and columbarium while you take time to view and reflect.

As a reminder, our columbarium has 80 total niches with each niche able to hold the cremains of 2 individuals in 2 separate urns. As of this writing we have 47 niches committed (59% sold). We also have 16 memory bands which offer families the opportunity to indicate where you or your loved one is buried, if other than in the columbarium. Purchasing a memory band is a way to show the connection to First Lutheran Church and to be remembered even though being buried elsewhere. We have 9 committed memory bands (56% sold). We have a garden area for pet burials, which utilize biodegradable urns for the pet cremains. We have unlimited space for our beloved pets and, as of now, there are 4 dogs buried in the garden area.

We will be ordering a second columbarium unit whenever we near capacity on the first unit. This second unit will likely be ordered within a couple years, pending future niche sales.

We are very happy with our garden and columbarium area, the beauty it holds, and the opportunity it provides to be inurned on church grounds. We want to thank all the volunteers who help maintain the Three Cross Memorial Gardens: those who mow, weed, trim, do the paperwork, and those that help when we have an inurnment. You are doing a wonderful job and we wouldn't have this beautiful place without you.
